

Dr. Fred Sebashoka

In Rwanda's ongoing redemption story, Africa New Life's impact is visible through the stories of formerly sponsored students who are now adults. These students, raised in the aftermath of the 1994 Genocide Against the Tutsi, faced bleak prospects and limited dreams. Their parents were often forced to choose between paying school fees or providing food and feared their children faced a life of poverty. Africa New Life came alongside this generation in 2001, and now many have emerged as Rwanda's proof that beauty can arise from the ashes. Through their successes, we glimpse the transformative power of education, compassion, and opportunity. **Fred, a boy from one of Rwanda's poorest communities, is one example.**

A cattle-keeping family for generations, Fred's parents, Clever and Faith, returned home to Rwanda in 1996 after the genocide ended. In 2000, they moved to Tanzania for better cattle conditions. Fred remained with an aunt in Rwanda, though his parents funded his education. Tanzania proved perfect for cattle keeping; however, in 2006, the government told all Rwandans living in Tanzania to return to Rwanda with whatever they could carry.

"When they told me I had a sponsor, I thought I was dreaming! It was the beginning of my dreams coming true and having hope of a future. When they register you, they ask, 'What is your dream?' I knew I would be able to study hard if I got a sponsor, so I told them I wanted to become a doctor."

Clever and Faith settled in a refugee camp in the drought-plagued community of Kageyo, now stripped of their cattle, livelihood, and dignity. Fred rejoined his parents, shocked to find his 10 family members living in one tent. Fred's parents used their resources to feed their children, leaving no money for school fees. Being forced to leave school devastated Fred.

When Africa New Life began work in Kageyo in 2008, Clever pleaded with staff to register Fred for sponsorship. "I was registered, but getting sponsors is tough for older students," Fred recalls crying while waiting, knowing that being chosen for sponsorship is difficult for older students.

When Fred was 15, the Dorway family sponsored him in 2010. "When they told me I had a sponsor, I thought I was dreaming! It was the beginning of my dreams coming true and having hope of a future. When they register you, they ask, 'What is your dream?' I knew I would be able to study hard if I got a sponsor, so I told them I wanted to become a doctor."

Sponsorship lifted the burdens of school fees and scholastic materials and helped the family overcome food scarcity. Fred was able to focus on his studies. He faced obstacles, but his determination never wavered, culminating in his graduation from the University of Rwanda in 2023, to the immense pride of his family and community. Kageyo celebrated its first-ever medical school graduate at their New Life Bible Church. "I wore my gown to the party and told my mom, 'Wow, I made it! I'm a doctor! I see God's work in our family and my life through my education."

With a servant's heart and gratitude, Fred plans to pay it forward. "In five to ten years, I want to be Rwanda's second cardiothoracic surgeon. With God's help and mercy, I will build a clinic that provides care to those without money. My other name is Sebashoka, and I'll call it Seba Heart Center. Pastor Charles and others built Africa New Life so vulnerable children like me living in a village could dream. Without them, I couldn't have hoped to become a doctor. I plan on sponsoring older students with Africa New Life."

Meanwhile, Fred is building a barn behind his parents' home to hold the cattle he plans to purchase for his father, Clever. Fred aims to rebuild the dignity stolen from his father years ago, a beautiful act of redemption made possible through years of Africa New Life's partnership and God's goodness.





Educational Sponsorship

Our educational sponsorship program provides vulnerable children in Rwanda access to education through school fees, scholastic supplies, and support services, empowering them to break free from the cycle of poverty and realize their full potential.



788 students completed their secondary education (12th grade) or the vocational equivalent



817 post-secondary students received support to attend university or a vocational equivalent



6,485 home visits were conducted by Child Welfare Officers



76,246 students participated in iLead training, in partnership with the John Maxwell Leadership Foundation and Rwandan Ministry of Education

Africa New Life prioritizes holistic well-being through initiatives that promote physical health and wellness, including providing clean water, nutrition, medical care, and hygiene education.



72,901 patients were cared for at the Dream Medical Center Hospital

Our team knows we are important role models; for some students, the team is their only role model."

30 Years of **Redemption** Rebuilding Broken Walls, Broken People

Reflecting on the 30th Anniversary of the 1994 Genocide Against the Tutsi

This year, we pause to solemnly commemorate the 1,000,000 people who were slaughtered 30 years ago in Rwanda during the 1994 Genocide Against the Tutsi. Senselessly killed were our mothers, fathers, children, grandparents, siblings, cousins, aunts, uncles, and friends. With each act of compassion that restores hope to the survivors today, we aspire to honor the memory of those we lost.

Even now, the sights of post-genocide Rwanda remain etched into my memory. Rwanda was a dark hole filled with the smell of death. Streets were haunted by orphaned children, widows, and childless mothers. Life was shattered, violence and hatred had taken everything. There were no jobs, no housing, and no infrastructure. The broken roads everywhere were symbolic of the country, which was going nowhere. The instability in Rwanda went so deep that the nation had no choice but to rise.

Our government embraced forgiveness and reconciliation as the compass to restoration, peace, and healing. Social progress and harmony grew. Neighborhoods that had been dens of robbers became dens of healers. Reconstructed communities stabilized. This work was good, but our people's pain remained palpable.

Today, Africa New Life's influence extends across Rwanda, permanently intertwined with Rwanda's redemption narrative. Survivor counseling, education, and vocational training continue to empower individuals and strengthen communities. Through planting churches and building child development centers, we have created lasting spaces to nourish people's health, education, and faith formation. Through it all, God has sustained us through servant-hearted ministry partners like you.

Today, the future is bright because it will be led by the redeemed! Rwanda's children, the beauty among the ashes left by the genocide, have grown up. In 2001, Africa New Life emerged from darkness, offering a single, bright torch to illuminate the path forward. Now, thousands of alumni each hold their own radiant torches, together illuminating the nation. As they step into leadership roles across the nation, I pray they lead with compassion, care, and humility, remembering that they are the most *extraordinary* testament to Rwanda's redemption story.

"I want to be an athlete professionally. I really want to go to the Olympics! I have big dreams."

19-year-old Kevin Gift is one of Rwanda's most powerful swimmers. His father introduced him to swimming at age 8, and Kevin's been gliding through pools ever since.

"I joined the Rwanda National Swimming Team when I was 11 and took 7th place at a competition in Uganda during my first ever competition. I have competed in many competitions since. I have a love for this sport!"

Kevin was initially sponsored in first grade, and then the Gauntt and Smith families sponsored him through high school. "I don't know where I would be had I not been sponsored. It means a lot to me; I know I wouldn't have reached where I am without Africa New Life. I credit them because the skills and knowledge I have gained are my foundation and the start of my success."

Sponsorship has strengthened the most essential aspect of Kevin's life; his faith. He shares his love for Jesus, stating he was baptized in September 2022.

Kevin Gift, sponsored student and member of Rwanda National Swim team

Last August, Kevin graduated from high school, where his focuses were math, physics, and geography. Now, Kevin teaches swimming lessons to children while continuing his own training. He hopes to go to university later this year and study astronomy. Dedicated to pursuing his Olympic dreams, and fueled by boundless determination, he's qualified to swim in several major competitions, including Spain's Commonwealth games. Kevin's parents and younger brother proudly support his athletic and academic aspirations!

"The Rwanda Olympic team works with the Ministry of Sports. You have to be really good to beat their times." Kevin strives to someday beat the trial times and land a spot on Rwanda's Olympic team. Given the scores of medals he has acquired, he may just become Africa New Life's first Olympian!
